Commencement just the start of life's journey and not an ending

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Congratulations! Your graduation is a significant accomplishment, and the whole Church in the Diocese of Columbus rejoices with you. Your hard work has paid off. We are grateful for your parents, family members, teachers, administrators, coaches, and friends who have accompanied you on your journey and helped you to make the most of your God-given talents.

Most of you will complete Commencement exercises. But what does commencement mean? The word appears in the English language in the late 13th century and is from the Old French commencement, meaning "beginning or start." In modern French, we use commencer. In the late 14th century, the English used the word to denote "entrance upon the privileges of a master or doctor in a university." By 1850, Americans used the word to refer to a graduation ceremony.

While it then may seem strange to have "commencement" exercises at the end of your education, it really is quite fitting. As you complete your studies, you begin a new phase in your life. Something new is on the horizon: a new field of study or new program for those going on to a new high school or university; a new career; or a new vocation for those considering priesthood or consecrated life.

Shortly after his election 10 years ago, Pope Francis began his Pontificate with three words: Journeying, Building and Professing. In brief, he said that "our life is a journey, and when we stop moving things go wrong. We always need to journey in the presence of the Lord, in the light of the Lord, seeking to live with blamelessness …"

He continued: "Building. Building the Church. We speak of stones; stones are solid; but living stones, stones anointed by the Holy Spirit ..." He further stated: "Thirdly, professing. We can walk as much as we want, we can build many things, but if we do not profess Jesus Christ things go wrong."

He concluded his address: "My prayer for all of us is that the Holy Spirit, through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, our Mother, will grant us the grace: to walk; to build; to profess Jesus crucified." As one chapter of your life closes and something new begins or commences, this is my prayer for you as well.

As you graduate, I invite you also to reflect on the meaning of the word education. Educare in Latin means to lead or draw out. The late Pope Benedict XVI said: "Education is not and must never be considered something purely utilitarian. It is about forming the human person, equipping him or her to live life



to the full – in short, it is about imparting wisdom." (Benedict XVI, Address to Teachers and Religious, St. Mary's University College, Twickenham, 17 September 2010)

To educate another is to help the person to be a better person: a conscious subject, free and responsible, open to the good, the true and beautiful; capable of entering into deep relationships with others -- of being with others and for others. I know that your parents, teachers, administrators, coaches and friends have tried to draw out the best in you, leading you to deeper knowledge of Wisdom and Truth. To educate means educating what is human in us, not only the mind but also the heart. True education involves developing a critical mind and a discerning heart.

We have all tried to educate you to critically and freely embrace the path that leads to life, that satisfies your heart's desire - which includes faith and community, which answer the needs of the human heart. In Latin, satisfacere and perficere (satisfaction and perfection) are synonymous. It is my hope that through authentic education, you may find happiness - satisfaction and perfection - in this life and the next. In the end, true happiness is found in God alone. May you be led to an authentic encounter with the Lord who is the source of Wisdom, Knowledge, Happiness and true Joy!

TCC senior awarded Amazon engineering scholarship

A Tuscarawas Central Catholic (TCC) High School senior has received a \$40,000 college scholarship from Amazon because of his high-tech thoughts on solving a low-tech problem.

"When I applied for the scholarship, I had to answer something like five essay questions," Julio Sica-Perez said. "The one I remember best asked, 'If you had the opportunity to work at Amazon, what would you create?' I came up with some thoughts on a system which would guide drivers to available parking spots on a city street or in a large parking lot.

"I thought of my own family's experiences trying to go to a restaurant or a shop and of people trying to get to my family's convenience store on a busy day and felt this would be something that would be of use to anybody at any time."

Sica-Perez attends TCC in New Philadelphia in the morning and the Buckeye Career Center in the same community in the afternoon. He said he applied for the scholarship in January in large part because of encouragement from his teacher at the center, Bill Alexander.

He is one of 400 students from 38 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and an Armed Forces base in Germany to earn the Amazon Future Engineer Scholarship. Seven of this year's recipients are from Ohio, with Sica-Perez being the only one of the seven from outside the Columbus, Cleveland or Cincinnati metropolitan areas.

The scholarship pays \$10,000 a year toward college expenses at the college of the student's choice and includes a paid summer internship with Amazon after one year of college.

"Supporting underserved students in their computer science education is not only important to us — it's imperative to building a diverse tech industry and future," Amazon says on the section of its website devoted to the scholarships.

Sica-Perez will attend Ohio State University (OSU) in the fall and is one of 176 incoming students – two from each of Ohio's 88 counties – receiving an OSU

Land Grant Opportunity Scholarship that pays the full cost of attending the university. He said the OSU scholarship will enable him to bank the money from the Amazon scholarship and other awards, giving him a solid financial start for his future.

He also has received the Believe in Ohio STEM Innovation and Entrepreneurship Scholarship, Horatio Alger National Scholarship, Dr. G. James Pinchak Memorial

Scholarship and Ray A. Kroc Award, giving him a total of \$68,500 in scholarship funds, including the Amazon money, he can set aside.

He has taken the equivalent of a year's worth of college courses at the Kent State University Tuscarawas campus and hopes he can graduate from OSU in three years.

"I definitely wanted to stay in-state for college because I knew my Kent State credits would transfer to any other state-related college in Ohio, plus I wanted to stay close to my family," he said.

His father, Celestino Sica-Calel, came from Aguacatan, Guatemala to Ohio in 1995, with his mother, Santa Perez-Tun, arriving from the same community a few years later. They worked at the Gerber poultry processing plant in Kidron and Case Farms in Winesburg before opening their New Philadelphia store in 2013 to serve the growing Latino community in Tuscarawas and Holmes counties, many of whom also work in the poultry industry.

"We specialize in food and snacks from Central America and have diversified into clothing as well," Sica-Perez said. "People come from all over to find things that aren't available elsewhere.

"I've helped at the store for the last half-dozen years or so and continue to work there, mostly on weekends," he said. "That's where I first became interested in computers because I could see

"I learned about the Buckeye Career Center in my sophomore year at TCC and knew they offered training in culinary arts, marketing and computer technology. When it came time to pick a specialty, I decided to go with computers.

"At first, I didn't understand as much as my classmates about them, but slowly I caught on." Taking an online computer science course of-

fered by Harvard University also helped, he said.

Sica-Perez received additional recognition in late April when he and career center classmates Christopher Ferguson and Xavier Pittman finished third among 10 contestants in a skills competition at the Business Professionals of America national convention in Anaheim, California.

"In two months, we put together a website called www.digitaltomatoes. net," which can be found on the Internet. "It's sort of like the Rotten Tomatoes site which rates movies, except it's for video games," Sica-Perez said.

"It's a fun thing, but we also considered it as something investors might be interested in if it develops a large enough online community of people who want to know about new and upcoming games and what games are trending.

"The convention was great, not just because of the chance to go to California, but for the opportunity to meet other people from all over the country who share my interest in computer science."

Sica-Perez also has played soccer for the New Philadelphia junior and senior high school teams for the past six years, most recently as a midfielder. He has two sisters — Shayla, 12, who will enter seventh grade at TCC in the fall, and Araceli, 7, who attends TCC Elementary School in Dover.

example to all his peers," said TCC High principal Jennifer Calvo, who said he has a 3.8 grade-point average. "His classmates chose him as the speaker for the school's commencement ceremony (on Sunday, June 4). I think it's the first time there's been a student speaker in that role, at least since I came to the school in 2009 as a teacher.

"I couldn't think of a better model of a student who is dedicated to his faith, family and community than Julio," she said. "One thing I'll remember particularly about him is the drive he organized last June that sent three boxes of clothes to impoverished and abandoned children in Guatemala. He truly has a servant's heart."

The Sica-Perez family attends Dover St. Joseph Church, where Julio has been an altar server since fifth grade and more recently has been a lector.

"A Catholic education for me and my sisters has been important to my parents, no matter the cost or the amount of work they've needed to put in so we could have the best education," he said.

"Being in an environment where I can talk about God and virtues, have access to the Bible and learn the teachings of Jesus has been tremendously helpful to me, especially when I realize these are things my public school friends can't talk about in class.

"A lot of people think religion class is boring, but I've always found it pretty interesting. I like the way Pope Pius XII put it in one of his encyclicals (Humani Generis, written in 1950): 'The truths that have to do with God and the relations between God and men completely surpass the sensible order.'

"Artificial intelligence is something everyone seems to be talking about now," he said. "It really intrigues me because it has many potential uses, some of which may be dangerous. I want to use my knowledge of computer science to help find ways to use it for the good of people."



St. Charles graduates 114 seniors

Columbus St. Charles Preparatory School presented diplomas to 114 members of the Class of 2023 during its commencement ceremony, preceded by a baccalaureate Mass, on Friday, May 26 in the Robert C. Walter Student Commons.

All the graduates will be attending institutions of higher education, with 99 percent going to four-year colleges and 1 percent to two-year colleges. One will be pursuing studies for the priesthood. They will be attending 54 colleges throughout the nation. The class earned \$33.1 million in scholarship money.

Five were National Merit Scholarship finalists and six were National Merit commended students. Class members performed 7,000 service hours.

Four Bishop Ready seniors participate in construction class

Four graduating seniors can add a few extra things to the list of what they learned at Columbus Bishop Ready High School. In addition to math, English and science, the students learned how to cut drywall, paint and successfully complete a renovation.

These newfound skills were taught in a semester-long construction class at the school that was introduced and taught by Ready alumni Shawn Golden, '96, and Brian Hamilton, '04.

Golden owns of KJG Consulting, based in Dublin, and Hamilton owns Hamilton Contractors, located in Hilliard.

The men proposed the construction program to Dr. Adam Dufault, superintendent of schools for the Diocese of Columbus. Golden and Hamilton had worked on construction projects in the diocese, and they wanted to create a program for high school students.

'We talked to Dr. Dufault about possibly starting something like this because of the lack of instruction or interest in the trades, and there really wasn't something like this at any other Catholic school," Golden said, "So, we wanted to start something to gauge interest."

The class, Construction Management and Technology, was first offered for the semester beginning in January 2023, and eight sophomore, junior or senior students signed up. Twenty students are registered to take the class next school year, and it will be offered both semesters, beginning in August 2023.

The students in this semester's class renovated the school's St. Michael's Chapel. A metal art piece of St. Michael the Archangel was hung in the center of the brick wall behind the altar. After construction is complete, a large crucifix will be hung in its place.

The tabernacle, where the consecrated hosts are stored, will be moved to the center of the chapel behind the altar. Statues of the Blessed Virgin Mary and St. Joseph will be positioned on the leftand right-hand sides.

'The chapel was very dated," Golden said. "We were looking for something that they could do to leave a legacy, and this is what we decided on. And next year, we're going to expand on this as well. We're really going to focus on the chapel for multiple reasons.

We wanted to make it a little bit more of a sacred space, and that was the whole idea. The students had a lot of ideas. We nudge them gently in certain areas, but they had a good understanding of why we were doing what we were doing, like moving the tabernacle to the center and ... the crucifix that's going to be hung and things like that.

"There's a little bit of play on the school colors (the new wall behind the

altar was painted a light blue), and that was decided by the campus ministry team here at Bishop Ready."

Before doing hands-on work in the chapel, the students learned Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) safety laws. They also learned about building materials used in a renovation, including stone, textiles, wood and metal.

"A lot of people have never cocked in trim (a material used around the outer edges of a room between walls and floors or ceilings) before or hung drywall (a building material used for interior walls and ceilings) or finished drywall," Golden said.

"The really neat thing about it was that each one of the students had a different area where they really excelled, and that was really nice to see.'

Ready senior Adam Schwab plans to do an apprenticeship – a trade program that offers on-the-job training - after graduation. Schwab said he wants to be an electrician. Although he does not foresee working in construction, he said the chapel renovation project is applicable to many fields.

"If you do a home reno, or you're doing anything like that, it could be involved with some trades, or if you want to go into construction, it's a good starting point," Schwab said.

He said the class has taught him skills such as cutting and hanging trim and mounting drywall.

'We started by putting up two-byfours on the original brick, and then we cut the drywall and put that up, and then we had to mount it," Schwab said. "We painted it ... and then the trim."

Senior Luke Ruth said he has enjoyed the class because it allowed him to work with his hands.

"I think it's a fun class," he said. "You're getting out of the classroom. You're not just sitting there looking at a board, so it's hands on. It's fun. I'm a hands-on person, so I like doing stuff like this."

The class has taught him the proper use of tools and how to complete a renovation.

'We use saws and a lot of screwdrivers, and it's just basic things you need to know when it comes to renovating anything or building," he said.

Ruth plans to pursue a career in business after graduation, and the class has helped prepare him.

"It taught me how to work with other people because, here, we only have a certain amount of tools, so we have to share them and communicate through that," he said.

Ready senior Lucas Johnston agreed that the construction class taught him life skills, the most important being teamwork.

"I would recommend it," he said. "It really helps you learn things you need to learn in life, if you ever need to fix anything on your own, and it teaches you how to work with others.'

As a result of taking the class, Johnston said he understands OSHA guidelines, how to hang drywall and mud drywall (applying a mud-like paste) and use tools.

Joel Salto, a Ready senior who will graduate this spring, said the class "opens bigger opportunities that I want to do, like if I want to drywall or be a painter."

He plans to apply the construction skills to home renovation projects.

"If I want to do my house, like fix something, or my parents' house, it teaches me how to do more of it," Salto said.

While a few students in the class plan to enroll in trade programs after graduation, others are interested in pursuing higher education.

One student wants to attend college to study engineering, which Golden said is 'definitely an offshoot of this and, hopefully, gives him a little bit of understanding of what actually goes on in the building process, as opposed to just designing something."

No matter the student's path, Golden said he expects the skills students learned in the class will serve them well beyond graduation.



Bishop Watterson senior practices English with Ukrainian teens

When many people worldwide began to learn more about Ukraine in early 2022 when the Ukraine-Russia war began, Columbus Bishop Watterson High School senior Ava Gruver was already well informed.

She began tutoring Ukrainian teens weekly in 2021 through a program called ENGin, and, except for a short pause when the conflict began, she continues the weekly sessions.

Gruver has spent about 60 hours tutoring three Ukrainian teens, working out times to meet on Zoom over email due to the seven-hour time difference. ENGin provides materials and matches up the tutors and Ukrainian students based on common interests.

"The Ukrainian teens are at different levels with their English; some are advanced, and some are beginners," Gruver said. "I help them with their fluency based on their level of English, with topics like work, education, environment, social issues, debating, writing, holidays, family and other things."

The ENGin lesson plans include discussions, articles, videos, games and quizzes. Sessions usually start with vocabulary terms related to the day's lesson.

"The Ukrainian students all have different reasons for doing the program," Gruver said. "For one girl, the school required it. Another wants to go into IT.

"A majority of them know Russian really well, and they've been taking English since kindergarten. Learning about America and England is a big part of their education. They want to move to Europe or America where they will need to know English."

Since she started with the ENGin program, Gruver has observed the shift from a Ukraine at peace to a country at war through her sessions with the Ukrainian teens.


"For a long time, they didn't go to school and spent their time laying low," Gruver said. "It was surreal to me. There's a bombing raid going on, and they're online trying to learn English. That is still a priority.

"It's interesting how they're able to separate that and still focus on learning English. They did a pretty good job of not getting too emotional about it."

Gruver was surprised that bomb shelters still exist and that it became normal to spend time in them for the Ukrainian teens.

"I would ask them how it was going with the war, and they'd say, 'It's so sad, there are a lot of deaths," she said. "I try not to be constantly talking about the war with them because it's a sensitive subject, so I try to talk about other things."

She has found common ground with the Ukrainian teens, talking about sim-

ilar things American teenagers discuss.

"In America, we use a lot of polite small talk, but in Ukraine small talk isn't a thing for them," Gruver said. "But they are similar to American teenagers when it comes to things like hanging out with friends, having to do schoolwork, wanting to be a part of a group, having dreams about becoming a doctor or something like that. There's also some humor that

comes across."

Another commonality for them is the shift out of high school. As the Ukrainian students move on to university studies, and Gruver moves on to Ohio State University to study neuroscience on a pre-veterinary track, she said they will continue to stay in touch, thanks to Instagram.

212 seniors graduate from Bishop Watterson

Columbus Bishop Watterson High School awarded diplomas to 212 graduating seniors on Saturday, May 27 in the school gymnasium. A Baccalaureate Mass was celebrated there on Thursday, May 25.

Ninety-eight percent (208) of the class members were accepted at institutions of higher education and received more than \$22.3 million in college merit scholarship offers. They will be attending 56 colleges and universities. One student will be entering the U.S. Coast Guard, and one will join the Ohio Air National Guard.

The school awarded 96 state honors diplomas, with 99 students receiving the Presidential Award for Excellence. One class member had a perfect score of 36 on the American College Test, and 11 had perfect scores in individual subjects. Class members totaled more than 9,215 service hours in addition to the required sophomore service training program.

Thirty-two students were honored as valedictorians, meaning they had a grade-point average of 4.0 or better and 12 credits of honors courses. There were 193 academic medals, presented for an "A" average all four years, awarded in in-

dividual subjects. Fourteen students received service charity cords for at least 220 hours of community service above the sophomore service requirement.

DeSales grad heads for Harvard with list of accomplishments

As Columbus St. Francis DeSales High School Student Council president Richael Saka prepared to graduate, she was feeling mixed emotions.

"It's a bit bittersweet to be leaving Student Council," she said, "but I know next year we'll be in good hands."

"I do a lot of things in my community specifically related to my passions in computer science or social justice," she said. "I started the Code Club at St. Francis DeSales, so I teach and create the curriculums to help allow some of my peers to learn to code and program and also teaching them engineering fundamentals.

"I was able to help conduct some work-

shops for some elementary and middle school students, as well, so that they can learn how to code and program, especially young women who don't often see themselves represented in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math)."

Saka is a National Merit Scholar. She entered the National Merit Scholarship Program based on her Preliminary SAT/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test score. High school students typically take the exam their junior year. The exam covers reading, writing and language and math.

She is one of approximately 50,000 students, of the 1.5 million high school students who took the exam, to qualify for the National Merit Scholarship

program. She was recognized as a Commended Student.

Saka is a first-generation American. She was born in the U.S. to immigrant parents from Ghana. Saka said, from a young age, her parents instilled in her a work ethic.

Saka was awarded multiple scholarships for her academic achievements, leadership skills and service to her school and community that will fund her four years of college.

She won the national Amazon Future Engineer scholarship, which is a childhood-to-career program aimed at increasing access to computer science education for students from underserved and underrepresented communities. The scholarship includes a \$40,000 award and a guaranteed internship with Amazon after Saka's freshman year of college.

Saka won the Ron Brown Scholarship, which seeks to improve the lives of intellectually gifted, community- and public service-minded African American high school seniors by accelerating their progress into impactful leadership roles and opportunities.

"I was one of 50 around the country to be chosen for this \$40,000 award," she said. "We were flown out to Washington, D.C., in order to interview for the award. It's just a really amazing community.

"And, I really love being a part of the scholarship community as well because it goes so far back, and it's just a really good opportunity for me to network with other POC (people of color) students and people in all walks of life."

Saka was also selected for the Equitable Excellence Scholarship. The \$20,000 award seeks to empower students' future plans so they can continue to have positive impacts in their community.

The scholarship recipients "exemplify the facets of the Equitable Excellence organization," which she said means "working to make our community more equitable, striving for racial equality, socioeconomic equality in our cities." The scholarship recipients are "people who strive to do more for our society, even going on to what we plan to study in college as well."

Saka said she plans to continue her computer science and government studies, as well as involvement in extracurricular activities. She is also interested in continuing to learn Mandarin, the most widely spoken form of Chinese, which she studied in high school.

Saka competed in the international Chinese Bridge Chinese Proficiency Competition, which she was introduced to by her

DeSales Mandarin teacher, Mengqi Wu. "I've loved working with her," Saka said. "She's probably one of the most influential teachers that I've had in my life, and I am really grateful for her.'

The academic competition is designed for foreign students across the globe (outside of China) to demonstrate their mastery of the Chinese language. There were approximately 300 finalists for this past year's competition.

"I was top 10 in the world finishing the Chinese Bridge competition, so as a prize, they gave me a scholarship to study abroad in either Taiwan or China anytime during my college years," she said. "I'm really excited to be able to take on that adventure, as well, because I think learning foreign languages has definitely been such a big part of my life."

Saka was awarded the permanent title "Ambassador for Chinese Language." She will continue to work with the Chinese Bridge organization outside of school.

"The Chinese Bridge organization and the Confucius Institute are in charge of promoting learning Mandarin to foreign

speakers around the world, so I get to be an ambassador of the language and work

with the Chinese Bridge ... to help promote more people to learn Mandarin," she said.

She said that she hopes to work with Mandarin professors at Harvard to start a chapter on campus and to encourage her peers to enter the competition.

Saka is also learning to speak Korean. She was awarded a scholarship by the U.S. Department of State to take part in a language immersion program in South Korea this summer.

"There's a cohort of 15 of us going to Korea and taking part in this fully funded language immersion program," she said. "I'm really excited for that because I've really loved learning foreign languages for the longest time, and I think that will really help me on my journey to working in the United Nations and taking my skills to help tackle issues that are pressing the world on a global scale."

Saka was a semifinalist for the 2023

class of Coca-Cola Scholars. The program selects high school seniors across the country for their academic excellence, leadership and service demonstrated in school and community activities.

Saka was also one of 4,000 high school seniors in the nation given an invitation from the U.S. Department of Education to apply for the U.S. Presidential Scholars program. The students are nominated based on their academic achievements

Saka said most of the scholarships she applied for and won were listed on scholarship websites.

Scholarship America," she said. "I've made countless scholarship lists for some of my friends who have been asking me how they can apply to scholarships and fund their education as well. These are the three websites that I always recommend people search for scholar-

ships that fit their demographics.' Saka was named a recipient of the Ham4Progress award, which she found and applied for through a scholarship engine. The award honors 10 students in the U.S. who demonstrate academic achievement and commitment to social justice. Saka received a \$3,500 cash prize, which was awarded by the cast of the Broadway musical "Hamilton" and the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History.

"We had to write an essay about how we are working to promote social justice and racial equality in our schools and in our communities as well," she said.

Saka said she worked to promote social justice in her school by being a part of the leadership team for SOBE (Student Organization for Black Empowerment). She said the student organization plans fundraisers and created a scholarship fund.

We started a scholarship fund here at the school for POC students that are coming into DeSales, and we planned the first-ever Black History Month assembly last year," she said. "We also planned another one this year for our second annual."

the board for a year. We learned a lot about how city municipal governments work.

"We worked closely with the Columbus City Council, and we met every month at the City Hall. It's really nice to be able to go there and meet different city leaders and just learn more about what us as a youth can do to make a change in our local cities and our schools as well.'

Saka demonstrated her leadership skills as a Bank of America Student Leader. Bank of America's Student Leaders program prepares community-minded youth for success through leadership training and work experience. Saka was one of four students in central Ohio selected for the national program.

"Every major city that has a Bank of America headquarters, they also have three to four Student Leaders," she said. "So, I had a paid internship at I Know I Can, which is a local nonprofit that works to help high schoolers at inner-city schools and public schools in Columbus to start the process of applying to college and pursuing higher education.

Being able to see how working at a nonprofit works and be able to be a part of that network of other student leaders was definitely such a valuable experience for me."

professors at Yale in order to create a program to encourage more POC and more youth to get interested in clinical research and also encouraging people to take part in clinical trials," she said.

"So, that was very rewarding to see how the process works in doing research relating to social issues and also ways that youth can definitely make a change in terms of STEM and research. That was a really fun experience as well "

For the past few years of high school, Saka interned at the University of Pittsburgh's bioinformatics (using software for understanding biological data) center.

"I did a research project there also related to data science and public health, and I was able to present my research at a few competitions and also even published a paper with my mentor," she said. "It's still pending, but it will be published soon."

Saka and her mentor, a Ph.D. candidate at the university, worked on a research paper for the American Medical Informatics Association, she said.

During her final high school semester, Saka interned at the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services.

"I worked in their tech informatics center, so that was really cool to see how I could use technology to apply that in a government aspect, how technology is used in issues pressing our city and our state socially," she said. "That's something that sparked my interest in wanting to go into the intersection of computer science and government.

"I can use STEM and apply that to public policy and issues relating to public service as well. I think that's definitely something really cool because I think people don't necessarily think of STEM as things that you can apply to maybe non-technical problems.

"I think when people think 'STEM' they think of tech startups, like Google or Amazon, not necessarily like the U.S. government or the United Nations. So, I think that's definitely something that really interests me."

While interning at the state agency, Saka said, she learned how data can be used to predict future actions.

"You could solve a problem relating to how people apply for unemployment benefits, how computer science can be used to more efficiently streamline the process of people applying for unemployment benefits ... and how the application process goes," she said. "You can use

computer science in pretty much any aspect of social issues or anything related to that."

Saka hopes to apply this knowledge to a future career at the United Nations.

"They do have a few jobs (at the United Nations) related to tech policy and equitability and technology, especially in Third World countries, and how technology can be spread to those countries so that they can have access to the same assets that we do here," she said. "I think I would definitely be interested in working on some of those projects."

Reflecting on her many achievements, Saka traced her success back to her family roots.

"From a young age, I've been taught having discipline," Saka said. "My mom, she came here with pretty much nothing, and she really taught me the importance of working hard and the importance of knowing that nothing is given. You really have to earn it. You have to work hard to deserve it.


